Aloha Sisters and Brothers,



39th International Convention:

First, I would like to thank the Local 1357 membership for giving me the opportunity to attend and actively participate in the deliberation and decisions made at the 39th IBEW International Convention held this past September 19-23, 2016 in Saint Louis, Missouri. The IBEW International Convention is held every 5 years and it is the single most important gathering of IBEW delegates across both nations (U.S. and Canada) as they will set the path and direction into the future for all our members and their families. Business Manager Troy Benevides, President Darren Sakai, and I, proudly attend-

ed each and every session with the sole purpose of providing our Local 1357 a voice and to ensure we insert ourselves into critical discussions affecting our working families back home in Hawaii. International Representative Harold Dias, Jr., Troy, Darren, and I along with delegates from our sister locals 1186 and 1260, made sure Hawaii was represented on every amendment, resolution, and law brought to the convention for discussion and vote. The delegation reviewed, discussed and voted on many issues including the Code of Excellence Program, RENEW/Next Gen Council, New Member Orientation, and the Support of Call Centers in U.S./Canada.

While in Saint Louis, we witnessed the opening of "The Henry Miller Museum," which was an inspirational event during the trip. In 1890, Henry Miller was a lineman in St. Louis and he along with nine other lineman together, set out to organize electricians to unite and stand-up against low wages and unsafe working conditions. Electricians came together and elected Henry Miller as the President of their group and held their first convention in November 1891. They drafted a Constitution, Bylaws, and an emblem, in which the National Brotherhood of Electrical Workers was born. Local 1 and its members in St. Louis, purchased the boardinghouse where Henry Miller lived and transformed the modest home into a living monument to the founding of our Brotherhood. President Darren Sakai was chosen to write a message from Local 1357 which was then placed on the wall of the boardinghouse; sealed and dedicated to the entire IBEW membership. It was here that the journey began and there is still a lot more to do; there is no stopping now. The next International Convention will be held in the year 2021.

I thank you once again for the opportunity the membership has given me and encourage everyone to get involved and participate in the process. Please take the time to thank one another for a good day; be appreciative for what you have as others are not so fortunate, and give back to your community in any way possible.

The delegates of the 39th IBEW International Convention approved several amendments to *Article IX* of the *IBEW Constitution*. Effective January 1, 2017, there will be an increase of two dollars (\$2.00) for "A" member contributions to the IBEW Pension Benefit Fund (PBF). There will be no change in the per capita that is paid to the General Fund, and therefore, the rate for all "BA" members shall remain the same. The following rates apply to the international office portion of all monthly dues payments for January 2017 and thereafter:

When out on the field, guard yourselves from accidental situations and exercise safe practices such as the use of proper signage, fluorescent cones when obstructing traffic, hard hats, safety vests, goggles, steel-toed shoes, and harnesses when up in the bucket.



When leaving the base yards, be sure to have all of your personal protection equipment readily available for any given situation. When was the last time you reviewed your personal protection equipment inventory?

WHAT'S COOKING FOR THE HOLIDAYS



EASY MOCHIKO CHICKEN

Volume 4 Issue 3 & 4



1 4-5 lb. Bag of Chicken Wings

1 C. Aloha Shovu

1 C. Sugar

1 C. Flour

1-2 C. Green Onions

2 Large Eggs

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Add chicken and soak for a minimum of 1 hour or overnight. Deep fry until golden brown. (double the recipe if using more chicken)

DOUBLE LAYER PUMPKIN CHEESECAKE

2 8oz. Cream cheese, softened

1/2 C. White sugar

1/2 tsp. Vanilla extract

2 Eggs

19-Inch prepared graham cracker crust

1/2 C. Pumpkin Puree (Libby's Pumpkin Pie Filling)

1/2 tsp. Ground cinnamon

1 Pinch ground cloves

1 Pinch ground nutmeg

1/2 C. Frozen whipped topping, thawed (Cool Whip)

MUSHROOM STUFFING

1 lb Fresh mushrooms, sliced

6 Tbs. Butter

1 C. White onion, diced

1 C. Celery, chopped

1 tsp. Poultry seasoning

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. Ground black pepper

12 C. Dried bread crumbs

1 1/2 C. Chicken Broth

2 Eggs, beaten

2 C. Apples, peeled and diced

1/4 C. Parsley, chopped



Butter one 9x13 inch casserole dish. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Rinse, pat dry, and quarter mushrooms. In a large skillet heat butter and add mushrooms, onion and celery; sauté 5 minutes and remove from heat. Stir in poultry seasoning, salt and pepper. In large mixing bowl, combine bread crumbs with broth and eggs, add mushroom mixture, apples and parsley; mix well. Turn into casserole dish. Cover and bake at 375 degrees F (190 degrees C) for about 45 minutes. Remove cover and bake 15 minutes longer to brown top.



Preheat oven at 325 degrees. In a large bowl, combine cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Blend in eggs one at a time. Remove 1 cup of batter and spread into bottom of crust; set aside. Add pumpkin, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg to the remaining batter and stir gently until well blended. Carefully spread over the batter in the crust. Bake in preheated oven for 35 to 40 minutes, or until center is almost set. Allow to cool, then refrigerate for 3 hours or overnight. Cover with whipped topping before serving.
